Board Governance

- Terms of Reference agreed and adopted so we have clear guiding principles
- Vision statement to reinforce a 'strong, cohesive, informed community' to keep up focused
- Full Board membership confirmed which gives us a good mix of agency and community representation
- Draft workplan created to get a clear idea of what the Board needs to deliver
- The Collective Impact Board wanted a simple way to keep everyone updated. The Collective Impact Board website launched 22 February 2022, in English, Arabic, Pashto, Urdu, Dari and Farsi. There is also a plan to add Somali and Bangla languages. https://www.collectiveimpactboard.org.nz/en_NZ/

Agency Engagement

- Information sessions with the Kaiwhakaoranga Service to understand the current support available to the community
- Information session with Canterbury District Health Board (CDHB) to discuss services and access to mental health
- Met with the Ministry of Justice (MOJ) to discuss gaps in the coronial process and this feedback was used by MOJ to inform process improvement
- Hon. Minister Radhakrishnan attended a meeting and shared her vision for the community with the Board
- Met with the Human Rights Commission and we agreed to meet regularly
- Met with the Ministry of Social Development's (MSD) Canterbury Labour Market Manager and the Board were given the opportunity to feed into the regional employment plan.

Training undertaken

- Governance training to enable us to work efficiently and effectively as a Board.
- Received training on what products and supports are being provided by the Kaiwhakaoranga Service and their connections to their partners that will help better inform services for the community.

- Community engagement training with an accredited facilitator so we have the tools to engage well with the community.

Community

- We escalated our first six continuously emerging themes affecting the community
- We recommended that the Kaiwhakaoranga Service send out a regular Pānui (newsletter) to ensure the community have access to information from agencies - this has been implemented and well received
- We recommended the Kaiwhakaoranga Service runs home ownership and law workshops, sessions will be offered in partnership with Kāinga Ora, Community Law and ACC
- Flyers were handed out at Jum'ah prayers and posters put up at Linwood and Al-Noor Mosques to gather interest in attending engagement sessions with the Collective Impact Board. You can still register interest by emailing: AskCIB@msd.govt.nz
